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For many, Christmas Day is a time for celebration with family and friends but for some it can be a time of isolation and loneliness.

This year **Donate1Create1**, in partnership with **Bfriends Charity** (Friends of Birmingham Children's Trust), and **Birmingham Children's Trust**, have joined forces to support young people this Christmas who would otherwise be alone, by hosting the first **Brum Community Christmas** event.

Birmingham care leavers who attend the event on Christmas Day will share a hot Christmas dinner together, take part in festive activities and take home some presents.

The event, which is being funded through donations and run by volunteers, has been supported by **BrumXmasDinner**, the organisation that has traditionally held the annual event.

Sam Richards, Co-Founder of Donate1

Create 1, said: "It has been amazing to witness what can be achieved with a small group of people who have a passion to make a difference. None of our care leavers should be left to feel alone or isolated, especially at a time of year that is all about family and coming together.

Brum Community Christmas is a family and we will make sure that Christmas Day will always be a special day for our care leavers in Birmingham."

Lee Yale-Helms, Co-Chair of Bfriends Charity and Director of Finance and Resources at Birmingham Children's Trust, said:

"It's important that young people don't feel isolated, and Christmas Day can be a very lonely time if you are on your own.

"We are extremely grateful to our community partners who want to help provide a special day for our care leavers. We are also asking businesses and individuals if they can afford to donate, it would make a huge difference to our young people."

Here's how your donation could help:

- For £50 you could support a young person to have a fantastic three course Christmas
 Dinner and a voucher for them to buy food.
- For £25 you could give a bag of Christmas treats and food for the young people to leave with on the day.

The awards opened with Andy Couldrick thanking all staff for their contributions during 2022, as well as award sponsors, before passing over to event hosts Sam and Courtney Richards, Executive Directors of Donate1Create1. Sam and Courtney then welcomed Zara Wahid, a Yr11 pupil from Holte School, who performed a powerful self-written poem about managing her mental health.

This was followed by Alex, Gloria, Brian and Kelly, all part of the Blessd Centre, who all performed spoken word pieces in front of an audience of 200 people. Jess, also from Blessd, then had everyone reaching for their hankies, after belting out an Adele song, packed with passion.

After the incredible performances the awards ceremony took place, split into two sections, each with five award winners being announced. The third award, the Young Person's Choice Award, was announced and handed out by Rebecca and Rickail, young peope representing the Birmingham Children in Care Council and Birmingham Junior Children in Care Council. The award winner was chosen by a panel of young people.

In between the two sections, our third young person performance was delivered in style, by rapper Ken Londa. Ken performed two of his own raps, the first written exclusively for the awards event. Ken lit up the stage, and had everyone bobbing their heads up and down.

The event was closed by Trust Chair Andrew Christie.

CELEBRATING OUR PRACTICE EDUCATORS

Birmingham Children's Trust invited Practice Educators from across the organisation to a celebration event to welcome newly qualified Practice Educators to the Practice Academy Team.

The all-day event, held at Hollyfields Sport and Conference Centre in Erdington in September 2022, gave Practice Educators the opportunity to network and share knowledge.

The event also celebrated the valuable contribution the role makes to the social work profession and those in the role who are engaged in developing social work learners in the region.

Sophie Gilbert, Practice Academy Manager, said: "Practice Educators play a vital role in the development of social work students. This celebration event enabled us to recognise the achievements of both our student social workers and our Practice Educators at the same time."

After the presentation of the certificates, attendees took part in a workshop delivered by Dr Jo Finch, a Professor of Social Work and Post Graduate Research and Co-Head of the Department of Counselling, Psychology and Social Work at the University of Suffolk.

This interactive workshop explored how Practice Educators can best support and assess social work students who are struggling on placements.



FOSTER BIRMINGHAM LAUNCHES NEW WEBSITE

Foster Birmingham, Birmingham Children's Trust's Fostering Service, have launched a brand-new stand-alone website which is now live.



Website features

The new website is bright, contemporary and interactive and provides information to people who are interested in finding out more about if becoming a foster carer is right for them and their family.

It features live Web Chat with a Foster Birmingham Agent to answer any questions in real time, an interactive 'Am I Fostering ready?' quiz, an engaging animation that explains the process to become a foster carer, stories from our experienced foster carers, and a booking tool.

An ongoing collaboration

The new website is an exciting collaboration with Hopeful Studios.

Pip Gagliano, Marketing and Social Media Manager for Foster Birmingham said: "The website is a major resource in providing that first port of call information for people who are just thinking about starting their fostering journey and in encouraging more enquiries."

Phase 2 of the website will be developed next year and will include a secure log-in area for approved foster carers.

'CHILDHOOD' NEW FOSTERING FILM

In a ground-breaking national collaboration, 56 local authorities across England have worked together to share ideas and jointly fund the creation of a short film to raise awareness of fostering.

It is aimed at finding more people who may be interested in becoming foster carers and providing nurturing, positive homes for children and young people across the country who need them.

The new film, simply called 'Childhood', highlights the impact of neglect on children, particularly brothers and sisters who may be left at times to try and care for each other. It shows the journey of 'Sophie' and 'Charlie' who are in a very difficult home situation where their needs are not being met, to being nurtured and supported through foster care to attend school and be able to enjoy their hobbies and interests. In other words, have a childhood.

Lisa Jamieson, Birmingham Children's Trust Assistant Director - Foster Birmingham, said: "We are happy to be part of the collaboration with authorities across England, showing the amazing work our foster carers do on a daily basis. We all work together to support our children to be the best they can be."

A total of 56 local authorities have been involved in the project, and the film had a live premiere in October at The Everyman Cinema, Birmingham.

LABOUR LEADER VISITS KEY PROJECT

On the day the Birmingham 2022 Commonwealth Games began, Labour leader Sir Keir Starmer visited Donate1Create1 at Action Indoor Sport.

Sir Keir Starmer was welcomed by Trust Chief Executive, Andy Couldrick, who spoke about the Trust's Commonwealth Games legacy work in Birmingham communities.

Andy was joined by Birmingham City Council Leader, Councillor Ian Ward, Deputy Leader Councillor Brigid Jones, Cabinet Member for Children, Councillor Karen McCarthy, Erdington MP Paulette Hamilton and Street Games Director Jen Carter.

Sir Keir met Samantha and Courtney Richards, directors of Donate1Create1 and their community hub team from Erdington.

Donate1Create1 was the lead provider for the Trust's main summer programme.

The visit included meeting young people from the local community who have been accessing the programme since it was founded in 2021, who were taking part in Commonwealth Games-themed team-based sporting activities.

Sir Keir met young ambassadors who have been part of the programme and its developments, trying his hand in a game of basketball.

Sir Keir also joined young people and practitioners taking part in football and trampolining.

He then went on to meet a young adult who has secured employment as the programme has developed.

Parents taking part in a healthy eating workshop invited Sir Keir to join them and talk about parent and carer sessions and what it means to the community to have a hub in Erdington, and the benefits of working in partnership with Donate1Create1.

The Trust welcomed the opportunity to share its journey with its partners and the community and its aspirations for future Commonwealth legacy activity in Erdington and beyond.

FUTURE YOU CIVIC RECEPTION

Birmingham Children's Trust was delighted to be invited to host a celebratory Birmingham 2022 Commonwealth Games Civic event in the drawing room at the Council House.

Andy Couldrick, Chief Executive at Birmingham Children's Trust, welcomed an audience of 125, including corporate parenting partners, businesses, community groups and leaders, Birmingham elected members, Birmingham City Council and Trust staff.

Future You showcases the emotional and inspirational journeys of four amazing Birmingham care leavers Musa Nela (**pictured below**), Zaynab Sohawon, Levi Allen, and Sabina Begum.

The Future You team had worked on the project for over a year and remain passionate about inspiring other young adults across the city and beyond.

As part of the event the audience was given the opportunity to ask questions of Abba and two of the other films' stars, Musa and Zaynab.

The event was then closed by Birmingham Children's Trust chair, Andrew Christie.

Following the event guests networked and many pledged to further support the Future You programme and the work of the newly formed Bfriends, Friends of Birmingham Children's Trust Charity.

Abba said: "It's been a privilege to have had the opportunity to develop four inspirational films with care leavers in Birmingham. These films show the reality of growing up in care and different challenges young people face in their lives.

"Our young people want other young people to see their stories and know they are not alone and they are not labels, they are in the driving seat of their own lives and can do anything and be anything they want to be.

"We defy the typical stereotypes people throw our way and we stand together. Care is not a label it is an act of looking after those you love."

Zaynab added: "The event was not just a celebration of the Future You films, it was a celebration of the courage of young people's unwavering supporters and a celebration of how empowering self-transformation is.

"I'm indebted to the team at Birmingham Children's Trust for allowing my journey to be shared, in order to make meaningful changes in my 'why', and I hope it helps other people find their 'why' too."

Andy Couldrick said: "It was a privilege to host this screening of our Future You films.

"The strength, resilience and potential of our young people shines through the films.

"Everyone in the audience cannot fail to have been touched and moved.

"Musa, Sabina, Levi and Zaynab are a credit to themselves and to all who have cared for and supported them on their journeys."

The Trust plans to produce more Future You films over the next twelve months.

SUMMER PROGRAMMES SUCCESS

The Trust and its charity Bfriends, Friends of Birmingham Children's Trust, formed a network with community providers that aspired to deliver programmes in the community for young people, and importantly work on how together we give legacy to this work.

Blessd, Essence Youth Mentoring, Law and Leisure Learning, and Solve, in partnership with the Trust and new Bfriends Charity were successful in bids to deliver Summer programmes across communities.

In addition, the ambition continued to further develop a hub model and the decision was made through Bring it on Brum, Street Games and the Trust that Donate1Create1 would lead a flagship hub for the summer at Action Indoor Sport in Erdington.

The programme included a main activities and sport hub, SEND and Sensory programme, football programme, gymnastics club, parent and toddler workshops and employment opportunities for young adults.

Two important principles have underpinned the work. Firstly that providers should come from, and be working in, the communities we are seeking to serve, and second that our programmes should provide skills development and employment opportunities to participants.

Alongside this Birmingham City F.C. Community ran their own Bring it on Brum programme. In partnership with the Trust and Bfriends Charity they took young people who have been a part of the programme since 2021 on a residential to a farm on the beach in Wales, in partnership with the charity, Farms for City Children. **See pictures on this page.**





Following the completion of our summer programmes we have received lots of important feedback from young people and parents.

Young people are telling us:

- "Being part of the programmes has developed confidence, new opportunities, friendships, new skills and talents."
- " A place that has become a second home that I feel confident to learn and grow in."
- "A loving and caring environment."
- "A place to go so I don't end up in trouble like my friends have."
- "Something that has kept me out of being in trouble with the police."

Parents are telling us:

- "I was worried about the holidays and my son being in trouble, this has given him focus and me peace of mind."
- "I feel I have been welcomed into a family myself I have learnt so much about several areas and I have made friends for myself in the local community."
- "My daughter had not spoken since lockdown, and I was really worried. A week into programme a new confidence came and when I left she said 'Bye Mum', a huge moment!"
- "We need more of these opportunities for our young people in the local area. I work evenings and weekends - these programmes have become a lifeline for us in so many ways. We cannot afford activities for our children and we worry about what else is out there when we let them out into the community alone with other young people."





We are really pleased to have welcomed our fifth cohort of Newly Qualified Social Workers onto our Assessed and Supported Year in Employment (ASYE) programme, as well as our third cohort of Social Work Apprentices into the Trust.

All have been busy with inductions and joining their new teams as they start their learning journeys with us.

Our ever growing ASYE programme recently received its largest ever cohort of 49 newly qualified social workers.

Our Practice Academy Manager, Sophie Gilbert says " It is so important to bring newly qualified staff into the workforce, fresh out of their learning and eager to make a difference; we are able to grow the future generations of social workers."

Each learner will experience monthly specialised training and development opportunities while working directly with children and families of Birmingham. They will receive wrap around support from their teams and the Practice Academy to enable them to complete their evidence -based portfolio and complete their ASYE year successfully.

Our ever developing ASYE programme has changed and adapted over the last few years and in a recent quality assurance visit, governing body Skills for Care leads noted the Trust's ASYE retention rates as impressive and the programme to be thorough and well developed.

In September we welcomed our latest cohort of Social Work Apprentices into the first year of their apprenticeship.

All apprentices have been recruited internally from within the Trust and all have experience of working with the children and families of Birmingham.

The programme creates a fantastic opportunity for our staff to develop and use their skills and knowledge to progress their careers.

Each year of the programme, apprentices gain experience by working in a range of teams across our front-line services.

We share our warmest of welcomes to all our new starters and look forward to working together on their developmental journey in the Trust.
