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## Trust property update January 2024

Trust staff have settled in very well in our new office base 'One Avenue Road' (see pictures) in Aston. The building has had high occupancy and work is now underway to add some wall art, designed by children and young people we support from Birmingham.



The latest phase of work at our other key base, Lifford House, is nearing completion, with all moves from any temporary sites to be done by April. We have now vacated Lancaster Circus.



The 'One Avenue Road' office is now the new home for our Children's Advice and Support Service (CASS), as well as our multi-agency Contextual Safeguarding team, EMPOWERU.

The 'One Avenue Road' office features a secure car park and on-site security.





## New Trust web pages – Linking to support

Professionals working with families and families themselves are now able to access new webpages on the Birmingham Children's Trust website.

These new pages pull together helpful links to a range of support services for children and their families - early help support, financial support, schools and education, domestic abuse, housing, adult and child mental health and other support organisations.

The Early Help page will link to the Family Connect Form. Professionals supporting a family or the family themselves will be able to complete this form to ask for help from their local Early Help Locality Hub.

### How the support now works

When you now click on the '**REPORT A CONCERN OR REQUEST SUPPORT**' button on the top right of the Trust website **www.birminghamchildrenstrust.co.uk** you will be taken to a new page.

You then select if you are a family or carer, relative **OR** a professional. Depending on which button you press, you will be taken to a new page with different support options.

You can see the screens to the right of this page. Please take a minute to check this out for yourself, in case you need to support a family or person yourself.

You will see in the top right a dark orange button, that now states '**REPORT A CONCERN OR REQUEST SUPPORT**'.

When you click on this link you will be taken to the web page below. At this point you select if you are a parent/carer or a professional.



The screen below then shows the different help and support options. This now means more targetted support.

## **BLUES PARTNERSHIP BEGINS**

The Trust's official charity Bfriends is here to provide opportunities for children, young people and families through forging fantastic relationships with commercial and community partners.

One such partnership was struck in late 2023 when Bfriends started working closely with Birmingham City Football Club.

The Trust has a base (called The Willows) situated right next to the St Andrew's football ground, and now we have a flourishing partnership with the team.

To celebrate the relaunch of the Birmingham City FC Foundation an event was held at The Willows in early December 2023. A group of young people from the local community, supported by the Blesst Centre, were invited to come and meet some very special guests.

The guests were Blues owner and chairman Tom Wagner, Blues chief executive Garry Cook, and seven-time Superbowl (American football) winning guarterback Tom Brady (see below).



Young people had the opportunity to quiz all three special guests in a private Q&A session.

This was a very special occasion, as the Blues Foundation was launched in partnership with the young people it is going to support. In late December additional young people, including Bella and Thomas, who attend short breaks at Charles House, came to The Willows to meet Blues players and be presented with a Christmas gift.

Bella even taught Blues men's first team captain Dion Sanderson how to sign 'Merry Christmas and Happy New Year', with assistance from Charles House manager, and Trust employee, Julie Clark.

## **BLUE NOSE DAY 2023 RECAP**

It was a memorable December for the Trust, our official charity Bfriends, and our new key partner, namely Birmingham City Football Club and their recently relaunched Foundation.

Thanks to the fantastic partnership working of our Bfriends Operations and Fundraising Manager Natalie Loon and Jeremy Dale at Birmingham City FC, an idea was concocted to hold 'Blue Nose Day' on 18 December 2023.

'Blue Nose Day' was the culmination of a major fundraising campaign to gather donations from Blues fans and the local community to provide 11,500 christmas gifts to be given to children and young people who are known to and supported by the Trust.

The campaign was a huge success as Blues fans bought sponge blue noses to help raise money as well as donations given from Blues corporate partners and sponsors.

'Blue Nose Day' itself was an incredibly busy and successful day. In the daytime work took place to prepare the distribution of the presents donated by the Blues. During the day 11,500 presents (teddy bears, winter hats, blankets and water bottles) were collected by Trust staff and community organisations, and delivered to children, young people and families across the city. In the evening 200 Trust staff were invited to attend the men's first team game against table toppers Leicester City.



A member of Trust staff (Lawrence Vos) even became one of the offical Blues mascots for the game.



Unfortunately the Blues lost 3-2, but at least fans saw five goals, including one by Jordan James.

Birmingham's foster families attended a special evening in Winter 2023 to recognise and celebrate the amazing work they do every day looking after the city's most vulnerable children.

#### Foster Carers of the Year



Keith and Carroll Daniels were awarded 'Foster Carers of the Year' having been carers for Birmingham Children's Trust (and previously the city council) since July 1972, that's 51 years of service! During this time, they have cared for between 90 and 95 children, and they have provided both short-term and long-term care. They are still in touch with some of the children they have cared for over the years. Although Keith and Carroll were unable to attend the event itself, they were presented with their award at their home which they were very humbled to receive.

"What a positive evening where we recognised and celebrated some of the achievement our foster carers have made to the children in their care.



## Equalities and Diversity update - January 2024

Addressing race inequality continues to be a priority for the Trust and since the launch of our race equality strategy, the Trust has been able to focus on being a more equitable organisation by driving change through fairer systems, processes, policies and decision-making.

Forty-six recommendations from the Race Equality and Diversity Action Plan 2021 and twenty-five recommendations from the Workforce Race Equality Standard (WRES) Plan 2022 have now been implemented across the Trust. In August 2023 we sought to build on this achievement by extending our work to include all protected characteristics with the launch of the Equalities and Diversity Action Plan and Timetable 2023/24 to support this work.

In addition to the nine protected characteristics outlined in the Equality Act 2010 we have also committed to extend protection to employees who themselves were former children in care. Also, in accordance with Birmingham City Council's commitment to the Armed Forces Covenant we have also embraced the Covenant's values of protection for this group.

The Equalities and Diversity function is now fully acknowledged as a key service area of the Trust. It is a well-used and valued service and cuts across all workstreams and service areas providing targeted support to Teams and individuals when needed.

Around 25% of our workforce identity as having a disability or serious health condition and for this reason we have recently focussed on this important area of our work. We do however have some good systems in place. Our Employee Assistance Scheme has an expanded range of support for staff. A Health and Wellbeing Forum has been established and our Health & Safety Committee continue to monitor matters that arise. In December, as part of our work for Disability Month, we invited staff with a disability or serious health condition to take part in a group discussion to share their experiences and for us to gauge our performance in this area. The voices of our workforce continue to form an integral and important strand of our work where we continue to learn from and respond to their needs - what we do well and not so well - in order to achieve better outcomes for all. Later this month we will be launching our Equalities Workforce Survey as part of our ongoing monitoring measures.

## ARE YOU LOOKING AFTER SOMEONE ELSE'S CHILD?

If you have been caring for someone else's child for over 28 days, and you are NOT a close relative (such as a grandparent, uncle or aunt, brother or sister, or step-parent by marriage) this is called 'Private Fostering'.

Here at Birmingham Children's Trust we need to be made aware of these arrangements. We are here to help you, and any children you are caring for.
